I. NISARGA

NISARGA - a unit of Franciscan Sisters of Mary, Hosadurga works in 24 Grama Panchayats of Hosadurga and 02 Grama Panchayats of Holalkere Taluks of Chitradurga District, for the empowerment of Women, Children, Youth and Farmers without any differentiation of caste, creed and gender.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

01 WOMEN EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM

“When you help a woman fulfil her potential, magic happens.” These words of Sara Blakely aptly emphasize the priority given by the organization for the empowerment of women in Hosadurga Taluk. The purpose of our interventions is to help the women to realize their full potential, to bring about the desired changes in the social, economic, cultural and environmental aspects of the families and communities. Therefore, the activities undertaken for the empowerment of women during the year are:

A. Trainings:

Trainings and information dissemination has been the major focus in the formation and capacity building of 496 SHGs, 19 Cluster and 01 Taluk level Federations. 9428 women have participated in the 345 trainings organized during the year.

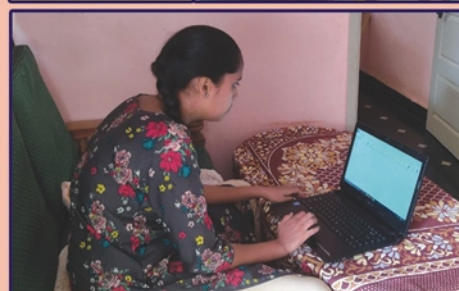

C. Facilitation for credit requirements to SHGs:

Formation and capacity building of SHGs has enabled women to emerge as successful micro entrepreneurs. They contribute significantly to the family income. Therefore, facilitation of credit from financial institutions to SHGs for self-employment, productive and income generating activities is an integral part of the women empowerment. During the year, 282 SHGs and 07 CLFs (Cluster Level Federations) have availed Rs. 7,32,83,000/- for agriculture, dairy farming, milk dairy, sheep/goat rearing, poultry farming, flour mill, tea stall, bakery, petty business, vegetable/flower/coconut vending, tailoring etc.

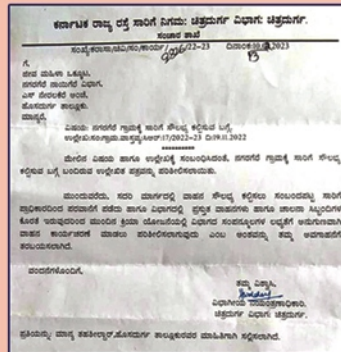

Lack of basic necessities of life and problem in human relationship seriously threatens society itself or hampers aspirations of individuals and their community. To promote wellbeing and harmony in and among families and the community, SHG members are motivated to identify and resolve issues and concerns affecting them. During the year, 19 such issues and concerns were attended to. They are:

SELF HELP GROUP THAT INSPIRED SELF-RELIANCE

Pushpa and her husband Shivalingappa are the residents of Anivala Village, Hosadurga Taluk, Chitradurga District. They have two children. Elder daughter is doing BCA and younger son is studying in PUC. They are marginal farmers and own only 30 cent land. Hosadurga being drought prone area, meeting the daily family needs and educating the children depending on agriculture was an impossible task.

Pushpa joined the newly formed Sri Sharda SHG under Nisarga in her village in 2006. In the course of the various trainings attended as a SHG member, she got to know how to make dairy farming a profitable livelihood option. Convinced of this she decided to embark upon dairy farming as her sustainable source of income. In 2008, she took a loan of Rs. 15,000/- from the SHG and purchased a cow. Along with the income from the milk they observed considerable improvement of their 30 cent land. With the application of farm yard manure to the farm, soil fertility and yield improved significantly. They cultivated different kinds of vegetables and sold in the village as well as in the local market. They were able to repay the loan taken from the SHG within a year and to pay the school fees of the children.

In 2010, they availed a second loan of Rs. 60,000/- and drilled a borewell. Since the water source was very good, they were able to grow the vegetables throughout the year. This ensured them continual income throughout the year. After meeting all the family expenses, they were also able to save some money for the future. In 2011, for the third time, they borrowed Rs. 50,000/- and installed a flour mill. Their net income from the flour mill is Rs. 12,000/- per month. In 2018 they planted 400 areca nut saplings in their 30 cent land. The areca nut trees are healthy and have already begun to yield this year. They have also constructed a house under 'Basava Vasati' scheme of Grama Panchayat.

At present they have 2 cows and sell about 30 litres of milk daily. Thus, dairy farming, flour mill, vegetables and areca nut have become their perennial sources of income. Pushpa acknowledges the unforgettable role of Sri Sharda SHG in the improvement of standards of life of her family with eyes filled with gratitude and joy.

02 MICRO ENTREPRENEURSHIP DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

“Never depend on single income. Make investment to create a second source.” These words of Warren Buffet rightly emphasize the need for equipping the individuals and families on need-based skills to support them to generate subsidiary incomes in today’s changing economic scenario. Therefore, in line with the programs for ‘protection and promotion of environment’ a micro entrepreneurship development program on ‘Organic Manure & Pesticide Preparation, Usage & Marketing’ was initiated in April 2022. 10 days long training with a day of exposure visit to the Murugesh Natural Farm in Madhure Grama Panchayat in Hosadurga Taluk were conducted for 3 batches of women farmers. Total 90 women were thus trained to prepare organic manure and bio-pesticides such as:

- ✿ Farm yard manure
- ✿ Vermi compost manure
- ✿ Compost manure
- ✿ Poultry manure
- ✿ Jeevamrutha
- ✿ Ghanamrutha
- ✿ Agniasthra
- ✿ Sarva roga keetanashaka

Each batch was assisted to prepare an action plan to ensure the sustainability of the training. This is being monitored through regular monthly meetings. Additional field-level guidance and technical support is given to the women by the Agri Specialist. It is indeed encouraging to see the enthusiasm and efforts of the trainees as they are preparing and applying the organic preparations in their own farms. The effect of it has convinced a few of them to begin the process of converting their farms totally organic. Efforts to persuade the trainees to prepare the manure in large quantity for sale is in process.



03 SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

“Technical Education is not only a ladder of opportunity, but it is also an investment in our future” says Ed Markey, because technical education focuses on imparting knowledge for specific purposes that help to build or improve one’s career. 23 students were supported with scholarship in the academic year 2022-23.

TISMO SCHOLARSHIP A BLESSING TO MY LIFE

I am Vani. My parents are Mrs. Sudha and Mr. Jagadeesh. We are four children. My eldest sister Veena, got married after her 10th standard. I am the second in the family. After me is my sister, Pushpa. Youngest sister Ramya, died when she was studying in 8th standard. We reside in Doddaghatta village, Hosadurga Taluk. My parents are farmers and we have 2.5 acres of land. My parents worked hard in order to educate me and my sisters. Since we belong to Lingayath caste, we had no educational benefits from the Government. I completed my SSLC in 2011 and did three years diploma in Civil Engineering. As I completed the diploma, I realized that to secure a well remunerated job I need to complete Bachelor of Engineering (BE). But the financial situation of the family did not favour my aspiration.

In 2014 my mother joined Eshwari SHG. One day Mrs. Manjula, the staff of Nisarga and Cluster Coordinator of SHGs in our area, on her routine visit to the SHG, visited my home. In a casual talk with her I shared my aspiration and the financial situation of the family which obstructed the pursuit of my dream. She told me that I could try for a scholarship from TISMO, Bengaluru through Nisarga since my mother is a member of the SHGs formed by the Organization. She also



told my mother that she could also request for a loan from her SHG for the education. I was delighted to know this and immediately approached Nisarga through Mrs. Manjula's help. Since they were just taking in the application for the year, I too applied for it. I got selected for the scholarship and my mother also took a loan from the SHG for my education. I successfully completed my BE in 2019.

Today I am a government employee, working as land survey engineer in the Revenue Department, Davanagere. This job helps me to support the family and the education of my sister. We are happy and contented. If not for the scholarship I would not have been able to be what I am today. I am grateful to Nisarga and TISMO who have been instrumental in securing a bright future for me.

04 CHILDREN'S CLUBS

“Children are the living messages we send to a time we will not see.” These optimistic words of John F. Kennedy rightly summarize the need for providing opportunities to the children to discover and develop their innate talents and capacities to help them grow as value-based personalities. During the year 13 Children's Clubs consisting of 450 children were formed. Once a week the children spent together three hours engaging themselves in studying the lives of national leaders, moral stories and general knowledge; sharing the news pertaining to local to international level; saving their pocket money for the future use of education; engaging in games, singing and dancing. At the beginning of the academic year 2022-23 each child was provided with a school bag and note books. The children's day gathering in November 2022 and the summer camp in April 2023 were special occasions for the clubs to come together, display their talents and cross learn.

I am Manohar, a native of Anivala village, Hosadurga Taluk, Chitradurga District. My mother is a member of Akkamahadevi SHG. When I was in class 3, i.e in 2003, I got the opportunity to join the Children's club formed in my village. Initially I did not like the weekly children's club activities which were held on every



Sunday. Gradually I developed interest in the children's club. I realized that through a number of activities and exercises in the children's club, particularly during the summer camp I was learning something more than that was taught in the school, namely interpersonal relationship, leadership, to have an aim for life, importance of education and values like love, friendship, truthfulness, adjustment, forgiveness, trust, respect, perseverance and hard work. These valuable lessons have influenced and shaped my life.

During my High School I also worked as a newspaper distributor boy. This helped me to lighten the burden of my parents in paying my school fees. After completing SSLC I did ITI. Then I worked in Federal Mogul Goetze India Ltd. at Yelahanka, Bengaluru for eight months. After that I joined for ATS (Apprenticeship Training Scheme) at Mysore and completing the one-year training I got selected in Maini Company, Bengaluru where I worked for seven years. During that period, I also got an opportunity to go to France as part of my project work. Now for the past two years I am working in Akna Medical Pvt. Ltd. Bengaluru.

I recall with gratitude the intervention of Nisarga through the noble concept of children's club early in my life. It was a wonderful platform for physical, mental and psychological growth. I received the needed inspiration and push for life as it fostered in me the qualities of self-confidence, self-esteem, honesty, sincerity, responsibility, cleanliness, discipline and determination. I am deeply indebted to all the sisters of Nisarga for this unique opportunity and all those who influenced and formed me.

05 WATERSHED PROGRAM

“To waste, to destroy our natural resources, to skin and exhaust the land instead of using it so as to increase its usefulness, will result in undermining in the days of our children the very prosperity which we ought by right to hand down to them amplified and developed.” - Theodore Roosevelt

Conservation, regeneration and use of land and water resources through the implementation of integrated watershed programs has been an ongoing activity. It is an effective mechanism to restore the ecological balance by harnessing, conserving and developing degraded natural resources such as soil, vegetative cover and water. The outcomes are prevention of soil run off, regeneration of natural vegetation, rain water harvesting, recharging of ground water table and introduction of diverse agro based activities, which help to provide sustainable, livelihoods to the people. During the year, a new project known as Protection of Ecology and Environment through Integrated Watershed Development in Doddaghatta Gram Panchayat was initiated. Through this project 344 hectares of land benefitting 277 farmers of Durgavara and N.V. Hatti villages will be brought under soil and water conservation activities. Out of it 68 hectares of land of 67 farmers have been treated with soil and water conservation activities during the year.

D. Sustainability of the watershed program:

“Raithashakthi Farmer Producer Organization” is an independent entity registered under Companies Act, consisting of 1000 Farmer shareholders who were the beneficiaries of watershed programs implemented by Nisarga.

Services provided by Raithashakthi FPO:

- ✿ Technical knowledge through formal trainings and information dissemination
- ✿ Quality agricultural inputs like seeds, organic/inorganic manure and pesticides
- ✿ Agricultural equipments on rental basis
- ✿ Market linkages

Production and consumption of food crops, using chemical fertilizers, toxic pesticides and hybrids has adverse impact on human health and nature. Organic and natural farming is the only way to protect ourselves and nature from deadly chemicals. Natural farming builds on natural or ecological processes that exist in or around farms. It integrates crops, trees and livestock, allowing the optimum use of functional biodiversity. It helps in restoration of soil fertility and environmental health, mitigating and/or reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Therefore, to promote sustainable agriculture and ensure long term sustainability through natural farming methods, a project for the farmers of Siddagondanahalli watershed under Pilot Phase of JIVA Program is initiated.



ORGANIC AGRICULTURE A WAY TO SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD

Mrs. Uma and Mr. Dyamanna are residents of Mavinakatte village, Hosadurga Taluk. They were married in 2006 and have two children. Elder one is son, studying in 10th standard and younger one is daughter studying in class 7th. They have 7 acres of land. In 2009 they availed agriculture loan of Rs 2,34,000/- from SBI Bank, Hosadurga. They utilized the same to drill a borewell and plant 2,500 arecanut saplings. But due to the drought condition in 2011-12 about 1,900 arecanut saplings dried off. In 2012-13 they availed another loan of Rs 4,50,000/- and planted 650 pomegranate saplings. Due to the ‘bacterial blight’ disease they lost the entire pomegranate crop. Unable to payback both the debts taken for arecanut and pomegranate crops they decided to go to Bangalore in search of job.

Nisarga introduced a new project known as ‘Climate change Adaptation’ in her village in 2017. Uma and Dyamanna’s land was also covered under this project. Along with the other farmers in their village, they got to know the impact of climate change, strategies to combat the climate change impacts through this project. They were also taken for exposure visit to the sites where climate change adaptive agriculture was being practiced. Convinced of giving a try to their newly found knowledge and techniques, the family decided to give up the idea of going to Bangalore. The project supported them for soil test, deep ploughing, silt and farm yard manure application for cultivation in 1 acre. They practised the integrated farming method with crop diversification, as instructed under the project.



Having completed the project requirements, in the first attempt of climate change adaptive agriculture they cultivated greens. They were able to earn about Rs 3 lakhs from greens. Second time they cultivated beans and earned again Rs 3 lakhs. Third time they cultivated cucumbers and got Rs 2 lakhs. In the fourth round they cultivated chilly and earned Rs 50 thousand. After that they took loan, Rs 1.5 lakhs from SBI bank and

another Rs 1.5 lakhs from Souharda. They invested the loan to drill a borewell and planted 800 arecanut saplings. They planted Rajnigandha flowers as intercrop. Meanwhile, the areca nut trees planted in 2010



also began yielding. They planted 500 more areca nut saplings again in 2021. At present their annual income from Rajnigandha flower is around Rs 8 lakh and areca nut is about Rs 6.5 lakhs.

Before the climate change adaptive agriculture practice, the yield from 135 coconut trees was 3500 - 4000 coconuts per annum. After the shift to climate change adaptive agriculture the yield has gone up to 25 thousand coconuts per annum which brings them about Rs 3 lakhs.

All these developments have enabled them to clear all the past loans, purchase a scooter, buy gold, construct a spacious house, educate children

and drill one more borewell. 90% of the farmwork is done by Uma and her husband themselves. Besides the added income, it also enhances their health keeping them physically fit and energetic.

The focus groups of Prathyasha are women, children, Adolescent girls, delinquents, orphans, school dropouts, people living with HIV/AIDs and Persons with Disability, senior citizens and their families. These groups mainly belong to Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe, Lambanis (Semi nomads) and minorities.

- ★ Livelihood options for women through self-employment such as petty shops, tailoring, sheep rearing, animal husbandry, Rotti making and Masala powder mill with a financial assistance of Rs. 10,000/- each.

- ★Financial support to start self-employment.
- ★Support for education of children, physiotherapy and medication.
- ★Provision of aids and appliances.
- ★Referral services for the mentally ill people: collaboration with Taluk Primary Health Centre.
- ★Capacity building through awareness and trainings on economic, social, education, empowerment and livelihood.
- ★Facilitation for availing Government schemes and benefits, especially 5% grant set aside for PwDs.
- ★Advocacy and lobby for 5% grant reservation in collaboration with District Federation for People with Disability.

- ★To update the knowledge and to motivate the teachers enhancement/orientation program were organized.
- ★To bring out the talents in students, science exhibition, singing, dance, speech, essay writing, drawing, quiz, role play and sports competitions were conducted.
- ★To prepare the students to face the board exam stress free online/offline training programs were organized.
- ★Created awareness on de-worming, elephantiasis, HIV/AIDS and Teen Star program in collaboration with the health department.
- ★Organized eye camp in collaboration with Salins Eye Hospital, Bidar.
- ★Conducted tuition/remedial classes for slow learners and economically poor children of class 3 to 7 in 6 villages.

02 EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

The lives of the young are influenced by two teaching sisters through the curriculum and non-curriculum activities at St. Mary’s High School, Shirva and St. Maria Goretti school, Hirgan. 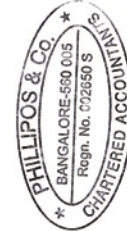
